A GUIDE TO

HOLY WEEK

Catholics have honored the last week of Jesus' life since the Apostles. Holy Week, stretching from Palm Sunday to Holy Saturday, is a time to reflect on all that Jesus suffered for us. It is a time to worship him as our king, and remember the light he brings to a dark world.

PALM SUNDAY

The beginning of Holy Week. Throughout this week, the congregation plays the part of the people who welcomed Jesus as king, realized he wasn't the king they thought he would be, and crucified him.

 Rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, fulfilling Old Testament prophecies



THE TRIDUUM

One liturgical day in which we relive Christ's Passion and Resurrection. We observe three special liturgies:


MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER (HOLY THURSDAY)

- Participated in the Passover/ Last Supper with his disciples
- Washed the disciples' feet (again, not the king they expected)
- Instituted the Eucharist and new priesthood
- Went to Gethsemane; experienced Agony in the garden
- Is betrayed by Judas and arrested
- Heals a slave

GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

- Was betrayed and abandoned by his friends and followers
- Was scourged, crowned with thorns and mockingly hailed as a king
- Made to carry his cross with a little help from Simon of Cyrene
- Was crucified under a plaque that read "King of the Jews"
- Darkness fell over Jerusalem
- Died and descended into Hell

MASS OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD (EASTER)



- Rose from the dead
- Appeared to Mary Magdalene and others

 Have a special reading about his entry into Jerusalem



Sing psalms and hymns about Christ the King

- With a joyful Mass, with gratitude for the Eucharist
- Instead of a final blessing, we have
 Adoration
- Priest strips and washes the altar
- All decorations are removed or shrouded
- All candles extinguished, symbolizing darkness
- We have now moved from the Last Supper to sitting with Jesus during his Agony

- No sacraments, unless it's an emergency
- Empty tabernacle and undecorated Church
- Candles are only lit when the Eucharist is present
- Silent and solemn procession for liturgy
- Read the Passion according to St. John
- Pray for everyone through Solemn Intercessions
- Receive the Eucharist, consecrated the day before



Venerate the cross by kissing it, kneeling before it, etc

- Gather in the dark, symbolizing the darkness of the tomb and our sin
- Priest lights a fire and blesses it. We follow the candle, like the Israelites following the pillar of fire
- Deacon sings the Exultet prayer, which is structurally similar to what Jesus would have prayed at the Last Supper
- Have nine readings and eight Psalms, which show the story behind the Salvation Jesus won for us
- During the Gloria, lights come on and we decorate the Church to symbolize Jesus rising
- Those coming into the Church are Baptized and Confirmed. We all renew our Baptismal promises

WHAT JESUS DID

Novenas with us!

What is a novena? A novena is a way of asking for the intercession of a particular saint by praying the same prayer/prayers for 9 consecutive days. Novenas can be prayed at anytime, but they are often prayed beginning or ending on the saint's feast day. Below are two novenas you can join us in praying in the coming months. St. Margaret of Castello is the patron saint of people with disabilities and St. Dymphna is the patron saint of those with challenges related to mental health. Both of these women had extraordinary faith in God.

To pray the St. Margaret of Castello Novena ending on her feast day, begin on Friday, April 5, 2024. Begin: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Pray: Dear God, thank You for the gift of life that You have given me. I am sorry for the times when I have failed to recognize the value and sacredness of life in others.

Day 1

You created St. Margaret with a great capacity for loving others, and with unique gifts that many people failed to see during her lifetime. Please give special grace to those parents considering abortions. Give them the courage to choose life and open their hearts to the child that God has given to them. St. Margaret you were rejected by your own parents, yet you saw God's goodness in all circumstances. You accepted the years of loneliness and isolation that you endured without losing hope. You saw suffering as a gift from God that helped your faith blossom. Pray that I would accept the suffering I have been given in this life so that I may more fully share in life with Christ in the next. Help me to not become bitter because of the suffering I endure.

Please intercede on my behalf for these intentions (State your intentions here). Amen. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.



Apostolate Grant Program

As of this year, the Apostolate for Persons with Disabilities has improved the accessibility of the Diocese of Madison by awarding over \$2 million in grants to parishes and programs of the Diocese. When Monsignor Larry Bakke began the Grant Program in 2013, he hoped to support the mission to enable everyone's inclusion in the life of the Church by utilizing the tremendous support the Apostolate had received from many donors over the years.

The Grant Program continues to be an important part of the APD's ministry. It is beautiful to see programs and spaces across the diocese be accessible and allow for Catholics of all abilities to live out their unique mission of discipleship as part of the community. We encourage you to think of a person/people that you know with a disability, then ask yourself when you are participating in events/councils/Mass at your parish: "Could they be doing the same thing that I'm doing right now?", If not, "What accommodations would make it possible for them to be able to?". You can also consider what would happen if you have a short term disability, a broken leg, for example. Would you be able to continue to volunteer/serve/receive the Sacraments/attend events? By thinking of these things, we are prompted to realize how our community, programs, and buildings can be made more accessible to everyone around us.

So, what has the grant program actually funded?

- ADA compliance for: chapels, confessionals, restrooms, doors, office spaces, sidewalks, renovation projects
- Hearing assistive technology, including many hearing loops
- Interpreter services and ministries to the Deaf and Hard of Hearing
- Catholic Schools and Reading Programs
- Monthly Lunch Groups for People with Disabilities
- Spanish Disability Resource Programs
- Speaker Presentations
- Elevators, lifts, ramps











Thanks to the APD Grant Program, we were able to host the beloved Advent/Christmas celebration at St. Clare of Assisi Parish in Monroe in 2023. This would not have been possible without the renovated spaces, accessible restrooms, and the Monroe community.
